

KEYNOTE SPEAKER

JAZZ GREATS & THE MUSIC
IN YOUR LIFE

For Roxane Orgill, author of non fiction books for children and adults, both public and school libraries have been a defining part of her life. From Michigan to Illinois, from London to New York, and on to her current home, in Dobbs Ferry, libraries have been essential to her sense of community.

Whether she was working at libraries as an employee, or in libraries as part of her extensive research, or just checking out books because she is a constant reader, Roxane has always had a strong connection to libraries.

Ms. Orgill will discuss her new book, Jazz Day: the Making of a Famous Photograph illustrated by Francis Vallejo (Candlewick Press, 2016).

She will share the creative process of turning poems inspired by a photograph of jazz musicians crowded outside a Harlem brownstone into a colorful children's picture book that received starred reviews from six trade magazines.
