A. Planning an Oral History Project (*Reference*)

Alexandra Kelly will be discussing the New York Public Library's Oral History Project and giving advice and instructions on how to start local history circles at your library.

Alexandra Kelly is an educator and oral historian. She has coordinated distinct youth media projects throughout New York and is currently working in Outreach Services and Adult Programming at NYPL. She is working on developing a Community Oral History Initiative.

B. Implementing a Culture of Creativity & Making: The Rutgers University Art Library **LEGO Playing Station** (College)

In September of 2014, the Rutgers University Art Library implemented a LEGO playing station to help stimulate creativity and innovation within the libraries. This presentation will address the creation, implementation and impact of this project and the ways in which the LEGO station allowed students to learn more about libraries and information literacy.

Megan Lotts is the art librarian at Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey. She serves as Chair of the Rutgers University Libraries (RUL) Undergraduate Experience Team as well as the RUL Advisory Committee on Library Services for Persons with Disabilities. She seeks alternative ways to assess ephemeral experiences and happenings.

Mary McDonagh Murphy is an independent documentary director, writer, author and television producer. Murphy's recent credits include The Making of Peter Pan Live (NBC, December 2014) and Live From Space (National Geographic, March 2014.) Her documentary film, Hey, Boo: Harper Lee & To Kill a Mockingbird, was released theatrically in 20 cities and broadcast on PBS' American Masters in 2012. Murphy has written and produced primetime stories for NBC News and for CBS News, where she won six Emmy Awards. She is the author of Scout, Atticus & Boo, a New York Times bestseller published by HarperCollins and teaches journalism at SUNY Purchase

Murphy also has written for Newsweek, the Chicago Tribune, the New York Post, Publishers Weekly and the Daily Beast. A native of Rhode Island, she is a graduate of Wesleyan University and was a John S. Knight fellow at Stanford University. She lives in Scarborough, N.Y.

She has written and presented on user experience with academic library e-resources, using massive analysis to inform collection decisions, and using ethnographic methods to gain insight into undergraduate research behaviors.
