Two couples become close friends as they arrange for surrogate motherhood until tragedy strikes, shattering the bond.

A sophisticated mystery combining classical music, passionate murder and high finance.

In this genial black comedy, a spunky heroine joins an innovative company which offers creative methods of knocking off loved ones.

Lieberman, Herbert (Chappaqua)

A middle-aged Manhattan cop pursues a serial killer and his suspected copycat through the seamy world of the urban dispossessed.

Ozick, Cynthia (New Rochelle)
THE SHAWL

Two haunting short stories of the Holocaust, linked by a magical shawl which nurtures then smothers Rosa Lublin's infant daughter.

A romantic saga of the Great Depression and World War II, centering on the affairs, marriages and children of two Southern cousins.
