- Elaine thanked everyone for helping make a successful event. 56 attended and 6 registrants did not attend.
- Most of the feedback was positive.

President's Report:

- Annual Conference
 - Possible breakout topics were discussed. Updated agenda is included at the end of these minutes.
 - o The panel speakers have been confirmed.
 - Keynote speaker Pamela Paul has been confirmed. Part of the speaking agreement is the purchase of her book, *How to Raise a Reader*, for each attendee. A program agreement has not yet been signed.
 - Terry confirmed that WLS will cover the cost of 100 copies of Pamela Paul's book, How to Raise a Reader. The Village Bookstore of Pleasantville will be placing the order and applying a discount.
 - The different WLA sections will be responsible for bringing a breakout topic to the conference.
 - The budget for the WCC space reservation this year is \$2,120. Deposit of \$1,560 has been sent. The balance is due on May 13th.
 - Food options were discussed and the board agreed that a bagged lunch, like 2019, was the best option.
 - Catherine moved to approve the insurance quote of \$651.99 from Rand Insurance for the one year of coverage for events. Diana seconded the motion and the motion passed.

Treasurer's Report:

- Net operating cost for the MidWinter Conference was \$155.
- Opening balance in checking account: \$16,718.19.

- Deposits, transfers, memberships: \$1,077.48.
- Closing balance in the checking account is \$17,795.67.

 Anthony confirmed the annual preparation meeting on April 30 at WCC for the Annual Conference.

Professional Development Committee:

- Westchester County Civil Service representatives will not be able to come to the March 4th Civil Service Program. Claudia Depkin will still speak. We hope to have a follow-up program focused on Westchester County Civil Service.
- The interviewing professional development events ready to go ahead. WLA needs to choose
 dates for the events, which will be held at WLA. \$750 is the total cost for both days. WLS has
 donated \$400 to the cost. The Special Library Association has agreed to donate \$250 towards
 the cost. Half of the total payment is due at contract signing.
- There are two upcoming Meet and Mingles. The first one is taking place at the Tuckahoe Public Library on Wednesday, March 18 at 5:30 pm and will be followed by a talk on the Woman's Suffrage Movement at 6:30 pm. The second will take place at the Hendrick Hudson Library on Saturday, April 25th at 2 pm.
- Supreme Court Law Library in White Plains will be hosting an event this year as part of the Access to Justice initiative.
- Terry noted that the Supreme Court Law Library of Westchester County in White Plains is going to have an opportunity for library staff to tour the library and get a better understanding of their resources and services available. This is part of the bigger program "Access to Justice Initiative."

About the Speakers:

Hillel Arnold

Hillel Arnold is the Assistant Director and Head of Digital Programs at the Rockefeller Archive Center (http://rockarch.org/) in Tarrytown, NY, where he has worked since 2012. He is primarily responsible for managing a small team of self-taught digital archivists who provide technical leadership and expertise which supports the organization's ongoing operations. In collaboration with his peer Assistant Directors, he develops values-driven strategies for use of emerging technologies, as well as ongoing maintenance of systems which facilitate the work of colleagues across the archival enterprise. Previously, Hillel has worked at NYU's Tamiment Library/Robert F. Wagner Labor Archives, the Foundation for Landscape Studies, and the Woody Guthrie Archives.

Robert Cartolano

Rob Cartolano is Associate Vice President for Digital Programs and Technology Services for Columbia University Libraries/Information Services. His interest in Fedora Repository development is informed by his accomplishments at Columbia Libraries/Information Services, which include development of a digital preservation storage system, the opening of three new

digital centers, as well as a Blacklight-based CLIO (Columbia Libraries Information Online) discovery service. He was formerly Director of the Library Information Technology Office at Columbia.

Kathryn Shaughnessay

Kathryn Shaughnessy is the Open Educational Resources Librarian in the University Libraries at St. John's University. As the Open Education Librarian, Prof. Shaughnessy's work focuses on the ethical dimensions of Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) access and ICTliteracy in education/library environments. Her current professional activities include raising awareness of the Open Ecology of Information, and facilitating adoption/adaption/creation of Open Scholarship resources across the university. As co-PI of a National Archives/National Historical Publications and Records Commission grant-funded project "Family, Immigration, and History: Grade 10 Citizen Archivists in the Digital Age," Prof. Shaughnessy works with NYC public school teachers to develop open curricula involving digital historical records. As a Senior Vincentian Center Fellow, Prof. Shaughnessy works with Vincentian Center for Church and Society in promotion of Catholic Social Justice literacy in academic and civil sectors, and serves as an expert for the Holy See Mission to the United Nations, covering agenda items dealing with ICTs, Development, Migration, Women, and Education. Her service to professional library organizations include serving on the regional chapter Executive Board of the Association of College & Research Libraries, Greater New York Metropolitan Area Chapter (ACRL/NY, 2009present), currently as the co-convener of the OPEN Discussion Group. She also serves on the national Executive Board of the Catholic Library Association, formerly as Member-at-Large (2015-2019) and currently as the Vice-President, President-Elect (2019-2021)
